### **Report Purpose**

To enable Council to determine the information to be included on the ballot paper for the referendum for an indoor pool.

#### Officer's Recommendation

That Council approve the draft ballot paper for the referendum for an indoor pool as included at Appendix 6.1.A and including the following information:

Poll on whether the electors of the Shire of Collie support the Shire proceeding with the development of an indoor heated pool.

#### Background

At its Ordinary Council Meeting on 8 August 2023, Council resolved to conduct a poll of electors asking if the community would support the Shire proceeding with the construction of an indoor heated pool.

The results of this poll will assist the Council to decide whether or not to seek the additional funding required for the construction of a pool. The balance of the existing State Government funds allocated to the project is \$1.8m.

A 6 lane 25m pool with an additional program pool is expected to cost up to \$8m. If less capital is raised, a smaller facility could be considered.

The cost to the Shire to run the pool will be between \$363,000 and \$1,090,000 per annum, depending on the size of the facility and the opening hours. The subsequent increase in rates would be between 5% and 15%. This would equate to additional rates of between \$75 and \$225 on an average residential property in Collie. This is in addition to increases required to meet the cost of inflation.

### Background:

At the August 2023 Council Meeting, Council resolved:

That the Shire of Collie conducts a referendum on the provision of a heated pool in conjunction with the Local Government Elections in October 2023 and that the referendum question be:

Would you support the Shire of Collie proceeding with the construction of an indoor heated pool if:

- all capital costs of \$4.5-\$8 million dollars, could be externally funded; and
- the ongoing operational and renewal costs were to be met from Shire general revenue which would result in an additional increase in Shire rates of between 5-15%?

### **Statutory and Policy Implications:**

In accordance with Section 4.99, of the *Local Government Act 1995* Council has the power to hold a poll of electors.

Regulations 88-92 of *Local Government (Election) Regulations 1996* apply. In accordance with Regulation 90, the Electoral Commissioner may, on behalf of the local government conduct polls and referendums.

### **Budget Implications:**

With regards to holding a referendum, the Western Australian Electoral Commission has provided an estimate of additional \$2,500 to conduct the referendum in conjunction with the October 2023 election.

Sufficient funds have been allowed in the draft budget for the cost of the referendum.

### **Communications Requirements:** (Policy No. CS 1.7)

Members of the Indoor Pool Working Group have been provided with an opportunity to provide input to the ballot paper. The following feedback was received and considered:

- In the background, the initial draft included a size when referring to the potential for a smaller pool. There was some comment around what the size should stipulate. The size has since been removed from the draft.
- Under the case for no, concern was raised with regards to how the "pool not meeting standards" was framed. This has been clarified to relate to income and use. Feedback also included that low attendance on the current pool is solely due to the temperature.
- Under the case for yes, reference to the economic circumstances of some people prohibiting travel of 50-60 kilometres to use another facility.
- The decision for the referendum being June not August.
- Some members felt the costs included on the draft ballot paper were excessive in comparison to the 2018 study.

The escalation in costs from the 2018 report until the potential construction is likely to be over a period of 8 years. The expenditure shown in the 2018 report is low in comparison to the actual expenses obtained from Western Australian pools. The figures on the ballot paper are based on the percentage increase used in the question. The Indoor Pool Working Group report identified annual costs as \$735,637. The average amount that rates would increase by, has slightly reduced from the initial draft following further review of the average rates on a residential property.

#### **Relevant Precedents:**

Prior community surveys have been held with regards to an indoor heated pool.

#### Comment:

The ballot paper should be impartial and include additional information such as background and arguments for and against and the question.

The following information is proposed to be included on the ballot paper.

Insignificant alterations have been made to the question replacing the symbol "-" with the words "to" and "and". The alterations have not changed the question.

### The question to be asked is:

Would you support the Shire of Collie proceeding with the construction of an indoor heated pool if:

- all capital costs of \$4.5 million to \$8 million could be externally funded; and
- the ongoing operational and renewal costs were to be met from Shire general revenue which would result in an additional increase in Shire rates of between 5% and 15%?

### The proposed purpose to be included on the ballot paper is:

"Poll on whether the electors of the Shire of Collie support the Shire proceeding with the development of an indoor heated pool."

### The proposed background to be included on the Balot Paper is
